Local content policies are often viewed as regulatory imperatives for investors, empowering governments to ensure that the exploitation of natural resources translates into meaningful socioeconomic benefits for their citizens. While such requirements can occasionally present complexities, they also offer a unique opportunity for alignment between investor interests and national priorities.

According to the Nigerian Content Development and Monitoring Board (NCDMB), local content initiatives have facilitated over \$20 billion in in-country investment, underscoring their growing influence on project structuring, supply chain development and capital retention.

As Nigeria continues to position itself for new upstream investment and expanded energy development, regulatory clarity, policy consistency and local capability development are increasingly central to investor confidence and project competitiveness.

**Strategic Panel Session: Building Africa’s Local Content Alliances - Progress, Gaps, and Opportunities**

Local content is increasingly central to Africa’s energy industrialisation agenda, evolving from policy requirement to a strategic tool for value retention, job creation and capability development. Across the continent, governments are embedding local content frameworks to ensure that resource development translates into sustainable industrial growth and stronger domestic participation.

In Nigeria, the NOGICD Act (2010) has driven a rise in local content from below 5% to over 61%, Ghana has followed a similar trajectory with its 2013 local content regulations helping channel over \$1 billion in contracts to local companies while creating thousands of jobs. Similar approaches are emerging across other African producers as local content becomes a key lever for building competitive energy sectors.

As Africa seeks to attract investment while retaining greater value from its resources, greater emphasis should be placed on policy alignment, cross-border collaboration and accelerated capability development.

How can African nations better harmonise local content frameworks to strengthen competitiveness, scale indigenous companies and deepen technical capacity across the energy value chain?

**Strategic Panel Session: Emerging Leaders – Shaping The Future of Energy**

The energy sector is facing a growing structural workforce challenge, driven by an aging technical base and a widening skills gap across engineering, operations and project delivery. Industry analysis highlights that a significant share of the global oil and gas workforce is approaching retirement, with some markets projecting that over a quarter of employees are already near retirement age, raising concerns about continuity in critical technical roles and institutional knowledge retention.

At the same time, demand for skilled energy talent continues to rise across traditional and new energy systems, creating what consultants describe as a “talent squeeze” shaped by increasing complexity, competing sectors and insufficient pipeline renewal.

This comes against a broader backdrop of rapid labour market expansion, where millions of young people enter the workforce annually, but structured pathways into high-skill energy roles remain limited. While Nigeria holds a demographic advantage, the ability to translate this into productive industry participation depends on strengthening training systems, deepening industry-academia collaboration and accelerating hands-on technical development across the value chain.

How can the industry accelerate skills development to address the aging workforce challenge? What models are required to strengthen technical training and industry readiness at scale? And how are emerging leaders contributing to delivery, innovation and value creation across the energy sector?

**Strategic Panel Session: Upscaling Capacity & Supply Chains to Meet Evolving Energy Demands**

As Nigeria’s energy sector advances increasingly complex and technology-driven projects, the conversation around local content is shifting beyond participation toward technical capability, operational excellence and long-term competitiveness. Whilst significant progress has been made in developing indigenous capacity, rising demand across refining, gas, infrastructure and industrial projects is intensifying the need for advanced engineering expertise, specialised technical skills and stronger operational capability.

As major investments reshape Nigeria’s energy landscape, the industry faces growing pressure to strengthen workforce readiness, accelerate knowledge transfer and develop the local expertise required to support, operate and maintain large-scale energy projects and infrastructure over the long term.

How can the industry better align training with evolving operational needs? What partnerships are required to accelerate capability development and support sustainable talent pipelines? And how can Nigeria strengthen technological ownership whilst positioning its workforce to compete within an increasingly sophisticated global energy landscape?

**Strategic Panel Session: Offshore Frontiers & Local Content - Nurturing Local Capacity to Support Production Growth**

Nigeria’s offshore and deepwater sector remains a critical pillar of its upstream production outlook, with renewed investment momentum, active licensing rounds and a growing pipeline of complex offshore developments reinforcing its strategic importance to national output.

At the centre of this opportunity is the ability to translate offshore activity into durable in-country value through stronger participation in engineering, fabrication, marine services and operational delivery. Emerging initiatives such as the FPSO Emem highlight early progress in building domestic capability in complex offshore infrastructure and strengthening local involvement across the value chain.

As offshore projects become more technically demanding, Nigeria’s opportunity lies in scaling local capacity, deepening supply chain integration and expanding operational expertise to support long-term asset performance and production growth. How can the local content ecosystem be better positioned to capture offshore opportunities, strengthen execution capability and enhance competitiveness across the deepwater value chain?

Across the energy value chain, this reliance has increased foreign exchange pressure, exposed supply chains to external shocks and limited the growth of competitive domestic manufacturing capacity.

As the nation advances its energy ambitions, strengthening in-country industrial capability has become a strategic priority. How can domestic manufacturers scale quickly enough to capture emerging opportunities? How can localisation requirements be structured to remain commercially competitive? What partnership models can be explored to deliver genuine knowledge transfer and scale industrial development?

Nigeria possesses vast power potential, with over 14,000 MW of hydropower, 210 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, and immense solar capacity. Yet the sector continues to face a structural paradox: significant investments in power plants that remain significantly underutilised due to limitations in gas supply, maintenance and transmission capacity. While installed generation capacity exceeds 13,000 MW, actual daily output typically falls far below that, leaving households and businesses heavily reliant on diesel generation. With growing energy demand and expanding industrial requirements to meet, ensuring reliable and sustainable power systems has never been more essential.

African nations are betting on solar in the long-term to replace oil in the current markets while prioritising gas for export markets. However with electricity supply coming from gas-fired plants and the critical need to build resilience into the energy systems cross Africa, many countries are currently looking at the power markets and the case for renewables as well as fuel switching to more sustainable and efficient fuels. What structural reforms are required to improve the efficiency and transparency of the power sector? What investment and governance models can unlock sustainable development?

**11:10 - 11:50 Strategic Panel Session: Developing Africa's Offshore Energy Frontiers – Marine Logistics, Ports and Infrastructure**



As operators expand their regional presence and accelerate offshore exploration, the capital intensity of deepwater drilling, combined with increasing technical complexity, continues to elevate operational costs, directly influencing commercial project planning and investment decisions. According to Reuters large-scale offshore exploration in West and Southern Africa has driven new discoveries representing around 11% of global finds since 2020, reinforcing the continent's role as a frontier basin for deepwater oil and gas development.

Unlocking existing opportunities will depend on a strategic, portfolio-wide approach that integrates long-range resource planning, enhanced subsurface insight, and optimal use and development of offshore existing infrastructure and export routes. Africa's offshore projects grounded in this alignment will be best positioned to influence the continent's evolving strategic landscape in the years ahead.

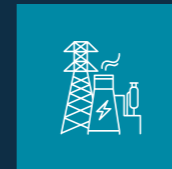

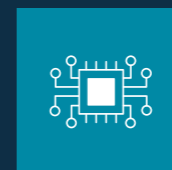

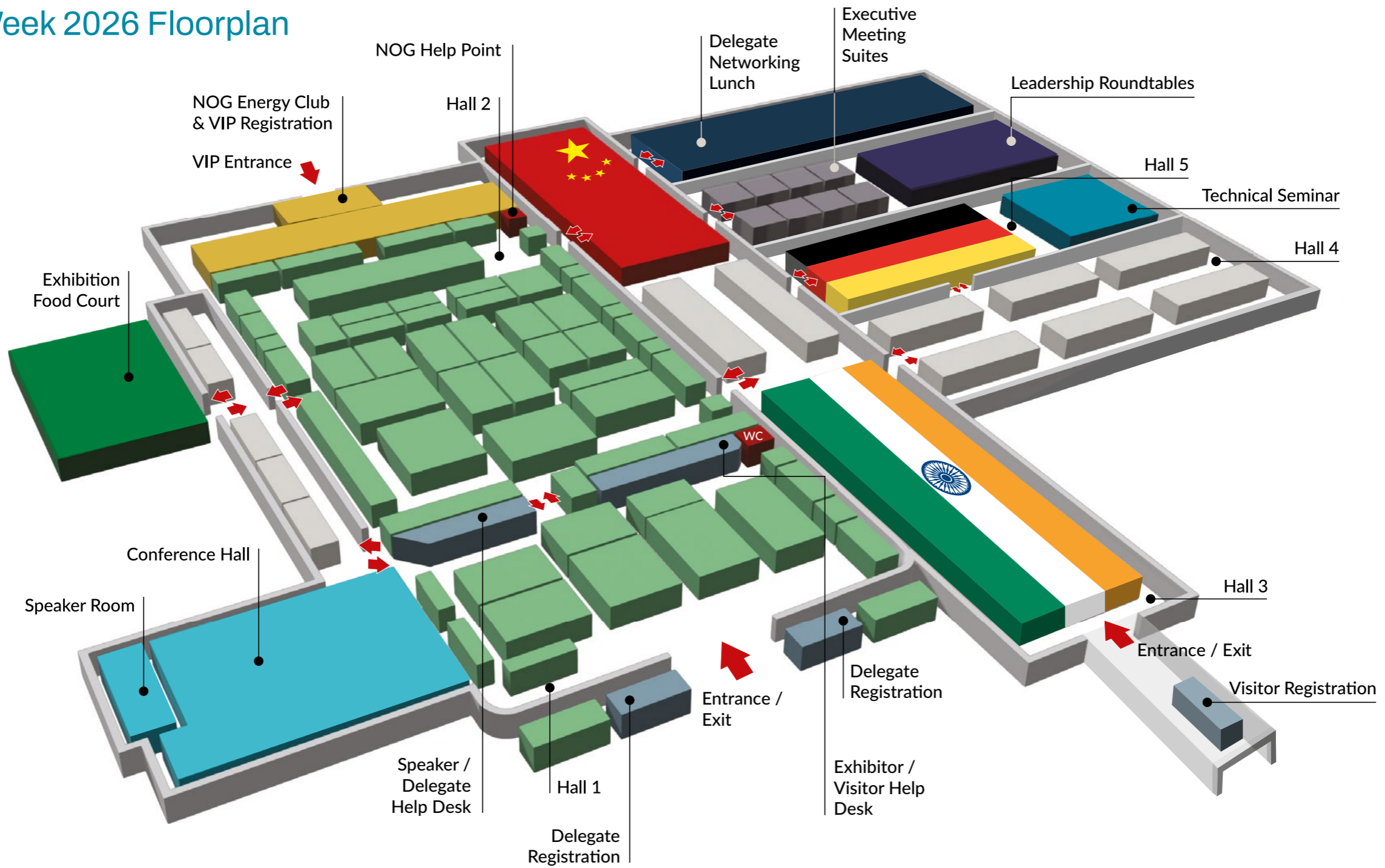
